INTRODUCTION

Dear brothers and sisters, the Holy Father reminds us that *pilgrimage* is a fundamental element of every Jubilee event because it reminds us that the act of setting out on a journey is associated with our human quest for meaning in life.

Welcoming with joy all the graces of this Holy Year, we have journeyed here as Pilgrims of Hope to experience the outpouring of mercy from the heart of our Lord Jesus, the door of our salvation. It is he whom the Church is called to proclaim always, everywhere and to all people and nations as our hope.

Let us give thanks to God for bringing us safely to this Holy Church and pray that our celebration may be a time of genuine, personal encounter with the Lord Jesus.

PENITENTIAL RITE

As we prepare to listen to the Word of God, we confess that we are sinners and ask the Lord for pardon and strength.

Have mercy on us, O Lord.

Show us your steadfast love, O God.

R. And grant us your salvation.

May almighty God have mercy on us, forgive us our sins, and bring us to everlasting life.

Almighty ever-living God, fervent desire of the human heart, look with favour upon your people who make their pilgrim journey in this year of grace, so that, bound to Christ the rock of salvation, they may happily attain the goal of blessed hope.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever.

FIRST READING

Isaiah 61. 1-3, 6, 8b-9

A reading from the Prophet Isaiah

The spirit of the Lord GoD is upon me, because the LORD has anointed me; he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the broken-hearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and release to the prisoners; to proclaim the year of the LORD's favour, and the day of vengeance of our GoD; to comfort all who mourn; to provide comfort for those who mourn in Zion – to give them a garland instead of ashes, the oil of gladness instead of mourning, the mantle of praise instead of a faint spirit.

You shall be called priests of the LORD, you shall be named ministers of our GOD. I will faithfully give them their recompense, and I will make an everlasting covenant with them. Their descendants shall be known among the nations, and their offspring among the peoples; all who see them shall acknowledge that they are a people whom the LORD has blessed.

Brothers and sisters:
Hope does not disappoint us,
because God's love has been poured into our hearts
through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us.
For while we were still weak,
at the right time Christ died for the ungodly.

Indeed, rarely will anyone die for a righteous person – though perhaps for a good person someone might actually dare to die. But God proves his love for us in that while we still were sinners Christ died for us.

Much more surely then, now that we have been justified by his blood, will we be saved through him from the wrath of God. For if while we were enemies, we were reconciled to God through the death of his Son, much more surely, having been reconciled, will we be saved by his life. But more than that, we even boast in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received reconciliation.

He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written: "The Spirit of the LORD is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the LORD's favour." And he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant, and sat down. The eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. Then he began to say to them, "Today this Scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing."

REFLECTION

From the Bull of Indiction of the Jubilee Year, Spes Non Confundit (1, 3)

Everyone knows what it is to hope. In the heart of each person, hope dwells as the desire and expectation of good things to come, despite our not knowing what the future may bring. Even so, uncertainty about the future may at times give rise to conflicting feelings ranging from confident trust to apprehensiveness, from serenity to anxiety, from firm conviction to hesitation and doubt. Often we come across people who are discouraged, pessimistic and cynical about the future, as if nothing could possibly bring them happiness.

Hope is born of love and based on the love springing from the pierced heart of Jesus upon the Cross. By his perennial presence in the life of the pilgrim Church, the Holy Spirit illumines all believers with the light of hope. He keeps that light burning, like an ever-burning lamp, to sustain and invigorate our lives. Christian hope does not deceive or disappoint us because it is grounded in the certainty that nothing and no one may ever separate us from God's love. [...] Founded on faith and nurtured by charity, it enables us to press forward in life.

A moment of quiet reflection and silence follows.

For these pilgrims and all who will embark on pilgrimage this Jubilee Year; may their journey be an opportunity for genuine reflection and their destination a source of true spiritual encounter with God's mercy. We pray to the Lord. R.

For government leaders; may they work together towards a just distribution of the world's resources, respect for the dignity of workers and establish concrete measures to bring about peace in the world.

We pray to the Lord. *R*.

For refugees, migrants, and all who experience the scandal of hunger, the anxiety of poverty and the stigma of homelessness; may they persevere in hope and may their physical needs be satisfied by the generosity of Christians. We pray to the Lord. *R*.

For families; may youth and parents embrace the future with hope and enthusiasm, and may the elderly and grandparents be loved and cherished. We pray to the Lord. *R*.

For a growth in faith and an increase of vocations in the Archdiocese of Toronto; may all heed the Lord's call to sanctity with courageous hearts and become bearers of hope in our families, parishes, schools, neighbourhoods and communities.

We pray to the Lord. *R*.

For all who are sick and suffering; may they find within the Church a source of comfort and healing, and for all who have died; may they be welcomed into the glory of eternal life.

We pray to the Lord. *R*.

O God our Father, you accompany and sustain your Church in its pilgrim journey; through the light and the strength of your Spirit, stir up in us a living hope, so that we may recognize the signs of your presence in the events of our world. Through Christ our Lord.
